Keep language Alive

Reading books together is a great way to help your child: Talk, listen and learn new words

How to share books in English and your home language


Talk about the pictures and what is happening in the story Encourage your child by making lots of eye contact and smiles

Make time each day to cuddle up with your child and share stories

Have some quiet, quality time together - switch off your TV, radio or mobile phone If you use more than one language. Your child may use English words - you can still reply or repeat what they have said in your own language

Visit your local library to look for children's books in your home language, there is always lots going on and activities to get involved with.

Sing or say nursery rhymes and songs together as sharing rhymes helps your child learn to read. Why hot share rhymes from your home language?



Books are everywhere

What can parents do?

Bedtime reading

Sharing books with your baby or child and reading aloud with them at bedtime is a fun, warm and loving experience.

Just by reading aloud together for ten minutes a day will see them grow into eager, confident learners, acquiring listening skills and gaining new words that are far beyond their reading ability.

A Perfect way to end the day

Babies and children love routine and rituals. The joy of looking forward to a story makes a bedtime routine so much more fun and exciting. Ending the day with a loving cuddle and a book helps a child wind down ready for sleep. Avoid TV at bed time or in bedrooms.

Give them a flying start.

Even babies that are too young to understand the story will be soothed and calmed by your voice when you share a book with them. Babies and children who love books and the pleasure of hearing stories and rhymes have a flying start when it comes to learning to read by themselves.

Keep on sharing! But remember to keep sharing books together, even when your child can capably read alone.

Things to try at home

Reading starts with good listening skills, so turn off your mobile phones and tablets, switch off the television and radio. Get comfy and start to share books before bed or anytime that suits you. Talk about who wrote the book and drew the pictures too. Discuss the pictures and ask questions, don't worry if your child chats and ask questions about what they see, this is just as much value as the words of the story. In fact first books in school have few or no words at all and encourage children to create their own story from the pictures on the page.

When your out and about point out signs and labels in shops.

Don't forget to visit the library they have lots of activities, events and story times to access and they are free. They will also advise you about what books are ideal for your child's age. Choose age appropriate books.
